Introduction

The Community-Informed Policing Program began as a vision of Montgomery County Councilman Will Jawando in 2020, in response to critical policing reform efforts that were ongoing throughout the country. The vision was to enhance police training and education in a way that would foster building relationships between law enforcement and the Montgomery County community. The collaboration would address pressing social issues and concerns that caused division between those who live and work in Montgomery County, and its public safety entities. He met with faculty and executives of Montgomery College, and work started on a curriculum that would offer education and training for police officers newly graduated from the Montgomery County Police Academy. Officers would be provided with tools to navigate a rapidly changing diverse landscape in policing. Further, officers would have an opportunity to explore and discuss in a safe learning environment those topics key to healing the damaged relationship between law enforcement and the most vulnerable communities they serve.

In October 2022, Montgomery County enacted Bill 17-21, Police - Community Informed Police Training. The bill, co-sponsored by Councilmember Jawando and Councilmember Hans Reimer, established a partnership between the Montgomery County Police Department and educational institutions, such as Montgomery College, to educate police officers in community-responsive policing, and to boost recruitment efforts by offering tools to build trust within the community.

Montgomery College was tasked with the research and development of best practices for socially just policing. The college also accepted the task of developing an outline for training and education and a curriculum for one of three elements of the program, which involved the training of MCPD officers newly graduated from the police academy.

The Curriculum

The curriculum is designed so that participants can develop the competency to apply 21st Century Policing concepts involving race equity perspectives, deep analysis, and community policing methods through interaction with subject matter experts. Facilitators are from a diverse cross-section of faculty from various disciplines--Criminal Justice, Psychology, Sociology, English and Reading, and the MC Library. Guest speakers with race-equity and historical perspectives are utilized, and community members who routinely experience policing are also invited for an in-person or virtual session with officers during the program. The curriculum provides officers an opportunity to tackle real-life, authentic, complex, policing challenges they may face, as well as tools to navigate a rapidly changing diverse landscape in policing. Further, officers would have an opportunity to explore and discuss in a safe learning environment those topics key to healing the damaged relationship between law enforcement and the most vulnerable communities they serve.

Facilitation includes periodic followup with officers to assess their use of information learned in real-life, practical situations. Since March 2023, 43 police officers have participated in the Montgomery College Community-Informed Policing Program. The next cohort is scheduled for September 2024.

- The program is also an opportunity to introduce police officers to the educational services of Montgomery College.
- Police officers are encouraged to complete additional studies at Montgomery College, by enrolling in credit and continuing education courses.

Opportunity for Community Engagement

Each session of The Community-Informed Policing Program provides an opportunity for officers and community members to engage in dialogue and sharing of ideas for equitable policing.

Criminal Justice

Professor Pruitt is an Associate Professor of Criminal Justice and a respected international law enforcement consultant. She is also a retired police captain--a 28year veteran of the Montgomery County Police Department. Professor Olmstead is an Associate Professor of English and Reading, and leads MC's Safe Zones, an informative and experiential training that allows participants to explore their knowledge and assumptions about LGBTQ+ people.
